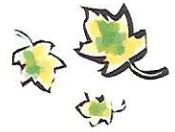

February Meeting
"Researching Canada From Afar"
Speakers: Lisa B. Lee Reporter: Lee Schlenker



Our speaker the month of February was Lisa B. Lee, a professional genealogist who truly enjoyed researching her ancestors in Canada (her favorite country). She also provided us with a very good hand-out as well as a listing of the Vital Records Chart for all U.S. states. This listing has nothing to do with her talk on finding folks in Canada but she uses it for checking out which state and when that state started keeping vital records. It may make your search shorter if you know where *not* to search and waste time. She keeps her chart close to her computer for quick reference. She also has two websites: www.thegenequeen.com and www.gotgenealogy.com. Her "gene queen" is for her professional services and the "got genealogy" site publishes a free newsletter which provides

genealogists with useful information on their online searches.

Lisa says her interest first came at the "ripe" age of 12 years and her interest was raised again with a visit from Alex Haley in 1970 to her high school. There had been slaves at one time on her mother's side of the family. Her great grandfather was one of seventeen children. Her Canadian grandfather had married twice - once to an Irish lass who died and then he remarried a German woman. So, Lisa has "white" relatives as well as "black" relatives. She always felt she had African blood within her ancestors but not so true. Prior to Canada's formation, the Métis people emerged out of the relations of Native women and European men. The offspring of these unions possessed mixed ancestry. The intermarriages of ►

the Métis women and Métis men resulted in the genesis of a new Aboriginal people - the Métis. There is a website for the Métis National Council (<http://www.metisnation.ca/>).

She had a grandmother who was like our modern day computer: she remembered who married who, names, dates, places, cousins, weather on a particular day, who was born when, etc. So Lisa figured out early on that if she didn't listen and write in her journal all the things her grandmother was talking about, she'd never have a good start to her genealogy quest. Her father had a habit of embellishing stories told about relatives and often times the times and places got switched to suit his mood which Lisa knew was not quite correct.

To start your research it is suggested that: 1) Identify what's available, 2) Go online at (www.ancestry.ca), 3) Go offline (LDS in Oakland has many items and the 1851 Canadian Census, 4) Hit the road! You must become very familiar with Canadian geography and the many names of the Provinces now known as Canada. It was once called the "Dominion of Canada" and "New France" prior to 1763.

What's different about Canadian genealogy? Lisa lists: the *language* (some records are in French), *spelling* (color/colour, center/centre), *citizenship requirements for some records*, *earlier church records* (more records online), *Census released* after 92 years vs. 72 years in U.S., no **public social security** info, *availability of vital records* controlled by province, *accessing some records* may require you to travel. Many people have done a great job of preserving documents, transcribing and publishing information. Some of the best: military records (muster roll, land claims, pension claims), church records, early Canadiana Online (www.canadiana.org), border crossings (both ways), Censuses (both population and agricultural), vital records (most post 1868).

Understand the major migrations: Canada didn't have slavery as we know it here in the States - they used the native peoples not so much for agricultural purposes but for clearing large plots of land prior to farming and building. The Hudson Bay Co. (1600 - 1800) brought in people to work and claimed a defacto government in the

plains areas. The War of 1812 gave soldiers land so there are lots of land records which are very good and explicit. Many of the U.S. Court Houses were burned during the war but not so in Canada. The Irish Potato Famine of 1845 brought an influx of Irish. The Underground Railroad (1795-1850) brought in slaves; but after 1850 the Slave Act ran out and slaves started to be rounded up and returned to the States causing them to move farther north into Canada. "Land Best West" (1909-1912) gave land to people free, but created undesirables and not the people who would farm the land.

Lisa found fewer errors on the Canadian Census than the U.S. Census. Canadian Census records were first released in 1851 and the last was released in 1911. The records can be spotty before 1851. Check Population and Agricultural Schedules.

Early newspaper searches can go back to the 1800s. The Provincial Archives have great info as well as the church records. Churches kept good records because the population was small and they had "circuit riders" who came periodically to perform marriages and baptize babies. So you may find a Catholic baptism within an Anglican record.

War records can be like gold! United Empire Loyalists (U.E.L.) were promised land in return for their loyalty to the Crown, but many turned it down. After the wars tens of thousands settled into the Maritime Provinces. Our own Civil War brought 30,000 Canadians to fight for the Union, but only 10,000 for the Confederacy. And in WWI there was the C.E.F. (Canadian Expeditionary Force). Lisa's relative used his older brother's name to enlist in the war because he was actually too young to fight. Lisa had a tough time figuring out who was who and why were there two ages for Oscar Douglass.

Lisa told us many interesting stories about her searches. She was a truly interesting speaker who held our attention for her entire hour presentation. Her handout lists more than 15 websites. I am unable to list them all here. So, please find a friend who has Lisa's original handout and copy it. It can be really helpful for your Canadian research! ■

With our 20th anniversary festivities over, it was back to normal business with Patty Erickson as our 18th President for 2005 to 2007.

In 2006, thanks to Ed Mason, we were given the option of receiving our newsletter either by e-mail or regular mail. This soon showed a saving of \$150.00 due to less cost for printing and postage.

At our November 2006 meeting Virginia Rood was awarded our 10th Life Membership.

By January 2007, we had a Web Page! Ed Mason worked diligently to get it up and functioning. He spent time searching for an acceptable name for our Web Page- one that was not already in use using the letters we needed. We ended up with srvgensoc.org/index.html. Naturally Ed became our Web Master.
